Congratulations to B/C Josh Flanders, B/C Dan Schiradelly, and B/C Jeff Warren. In December of 2011 these three individuals were appointed to the rank of Battalion Chief. These appointments mark a milestone for OFPD as that role had previously been filled temporarily by Lieutenants acting up, and now we have a Battalion Chief on duty every day, 24 hours a day, 365 days a year. In general, their role is to ensure the smooth running of the four fire companies and stations throughout the district, assuming overall command at emergency scenes and working through subordinate officers through coordination and direction to achieve the daily goals of the district while ensuring compliance with departmental policies and procedures. The Battalion Chiefs report directly to the Operations Chief – Assistant Chief Bill Perkins. The OFPD would like to officially congratulate the three new Battalion Chiefs and wish them luck with their new assignments. Good luck and keep our firefighters safe!



Newly Appointed Assistant Chief

Bill Perkins was appointed to the rank of Assistant Chief in August of 2010. He is currently assigned as the Chief of Operations in addition to many other day to day duties. Congratulations Chief Perkins.



The Oswego Volunteer Fire Protection District began as a village fire department after a fire that destroyed the Congregational Church in Oswego in 1893. On July 17, 1895 the village purchased a hose and hose cart, and by August 28 of the same year, a fire company was formed. A hose house was added to the town council house at 65 Washington Street in June of 1897. In 1898 a bell was placed in a tower atop the house to signal the fireman for a call. This bell stood in front of Station 1 on Main Street in downtown Oswego until the end of 2009 when Station 1 moved into a new facility on Woolley Road. It now is once again proudly displayed at its new home at 3511 Woolley Road. Following a devastating fire that destroyed several buildings at a local farm, area farmers decided something had to be done to protect their interests. In 1936, the Oswego Fire Protection District was formed by voter referendum, covering all of Oswego Township and part of Will County. The district now also covers the majority of Na-Au-Say Township and a portion of Bristol Township. Andrew Pierce, Glenn Leigh, James Steward and Wally Davis were appointed the first trustees. March 2011 marks the 75th anniversary of the birth of the Oswego Protection District.

Student Riders

The OFPD often has paramedic and EMT students that ride along with the medic units. In 2010 The OFPD assisted in the training of more than 20 different medical professionals. The students come in and ride along through a structured program with licensed and registered paramedics that have been identified as mentors.


Board of Trustees President Retires

2010 Public Education Stats


Fire District Ratifies Union Contract

A new chapter was written for the OFPD in August 2009 as the employees of the Oswego Fire Protection District overwhelmingly voted to organize and negotiate a fair and binding contract with the Fire District. In November of 2010 local 4773 approved the proposed contract and it was signed by the district in the same month. The new contract was effective on 11/24/10 and is for three years.




Toys For Tots Drive Trophy won by Plank Jr. High

Mission Statement



The Oswego Fire Protection District has been established to provide the citizenry of the district with professional fire prevention, fire suppressions, and emergency medical service. To this end, the District must constantly strive to attain, as well as maintain, the confidence and respect of the community which it serves. This can only be accomplished through the constant and earnest endeavors of all District employees to perform all duties and assignments in an efficient, honest and professional manner. Fire Prevention Reports

During 2010 the OFPD conducted more than 285 plan reviews. Together with the fire crews we conducted more than 760 safety inspections. There were 287 inspections classified as other. The FPB delivered 58 fine letters. The letters and fines are intended to compel compliance to the fire codes. The FPB continues to expand its role and recently started a building review program. The program allows firefighters to review specific data about a particular building without actually being at the building. The more information that is collected from doing the annual safety inspections the more data the firefighters have to help them do their jobs more efficiently but more importantly safely! We will continue to strive to provide the best services for our communities to keep them safe.

OFPD Honor Guard Activities

The OFPD Honor Guard continues to represent our department throughout the state. They have added a new member to the team— congratulations to Lt. Jaimme Roscoe as the newest member of the team. The Honor Guard volunteers their time to participate in events statewide— unfortunately 2010 brought seven firefighter line-of-duty deaths and the OFPD participated in all seven events. Doc in A Box

2010 brought NFPA compliant physicals to the members of the OFPD. The physicals were conducted on site at fire station #1. The physician brought a fully operational exam room and office to the station in the form of a transitional Recreational Vehicle (RV). This allowed the physicals to be done while firefighters were on duty thereby saving money for the district taxpayers. NFPA compliant physicals are extremely important to the firefighter. They ensure FF's are capable of maintaining the highest levels of safety during hazardous and stressful situations.
