OVERVIEW



The Oswego Fire Protection District has a rich history that spans over a century. The department's origins can be traced back to the devastating fire that destroyed the Congregational Church in Oswego in 1893. In response to this tragedy, the village purchased a hose and hose cart in 1895, and by August of the same year, a fire company was formed. A hose house was added to the town council house in June of 1897, and in 1898, a bell was placed in a tower atop the house to signal the firemen for a call.

The department continued to grow and evolve over the years, and in 1936, the Oswego Fire Protection District was formed by voter referendum, covering all of Oswego Township and part of Will County. Andrew Pierce, Glenn Leigh, James Steward, and Wally Davis were appointed the first commissioners.

In 1986, the district began providing full-time advanced life support emergency medical services in addition to the traditional fire suppression services. The district continued to expand, adding Station 2 in 1998, Station 3 in 2004, and Station 4 in 2006. The district also shifted from contract paramedic/firefighters to full-time sworn district employees in June of 2008, swearing-in 51 district-employed paramedic/firefighters.

Today, the Oswego Fire Protection District is a career department operating out of four stations. These stations are open 365 days a year, 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. The district covers 52 square miles of the northeast portion of Kendall County and about 4 square miles of mostly unincorporated industrial parks in northwest Will County, protecting most of the Village of Oswego, unincorporated Boulder Hill, a large portion of the south side of the Village of Montgomery, approximately 1 ½ square miles of the Grande Park neighborhood in the Village of Plainfield, and a small neighborhood in the far northeast area of the United City of Yorkville.

The district's population is estimated at approximately 75,000 residents and growing, in addition to the daily visitors and workers along the retail centers of Rt. 34, Rt. 30/Douglas, and Orchard Road. Over the years, the district has seen a steady increase in the number of calls for service, with 6,678 calls in 2023 alone.

In addition to providing emergency services, the Oswego Fire Protection District also offers various community services and specialty teams, such as Fire Prevention and Safety Programs, New Construction Plan Reviews, Annual Building Inspections, Fire Cause and Origin Investigation, Technical Rescue Team, Swift Water Rescue Team, Public Education Programs, C.P.R. Classes, Community Block Parties, School Visits and Station Tours, and Certified Child Passenger Safety Seat Technician Services. The district also provides classroom and live fire training facilities available to neighboring fire departments and Waubonsee Community College's fire science program.

The men and women of the Oswego Fire Protection District are committed to providing the highest quality of service and strive to challenge themselves to achieve the greatest potential for those they serve. The district's mission is to provide professional fire prevention, fire suppression, and emergency medical services while maintaining the confidence and respect of the community. Through exemplary conduct, the district aims to foster and enhance the realization that the Oswego Fire Protection District is an important requisite to the well-being of the entire community. The district's historic bell, once atop the hose house on Washington Street, now proudly displayed at the entrance of the Oswego Fire Protection District Central Fire Station on Woolley Road, serves as a constant reminder of the department's rich history and ongoing commitment to serving the community.



Congratulations to Matthew Goodbred on his promotion to Lieutenant in 2023. He has been serving with the Oswego Fire Protection District since 2004.











In total, the Oswego Fire Protection District responded to 6,678 incidents in 2023. Of those incidents 77% were Rescue/EMS related and 23% were fire related incidents including 45 structure fires.






Currently, the Oswego Fire protection district is covered by four stations with three shifts (Red, Black, Gold) manning each station for twenty-four hours a day 365 days a year. 

















Busiest day of the week: Monday & Friday







TRAINING



Training leads to success in carrying out the mission of the Fire Department. The Training Division conducts, supervises and coordinates the Fire Department training programs to ensure that the Department is prepared for any and all emergencies.

The Training Division in 2023 was led by Lieutenant J. Johnson who was responsible for the overall administration and management of the Fire Department Training Program. This individual ensures compliance with applicable federal, state and local mandates while producing meaningful training sessions aimed at personal and professional development. The Training Division also responds to emergency scenes to fill roles in the Department's Incident Command System.

In 2023 the Training Division completed the following:


- Sent members to 73 outside classes

HAZMAT



In 2022, Oswego Fire Protection District (MABAS Division 14) became an associate member of MABAS Division 15 HAZMAT. MABAS Division 15 consists of 20 Fire Departments / Fire Protection Districts. Currently the Oswego Fire Protection District has three members (two of which are HAZMAT Technicians) on the roster for the MABAS Division 15 HAZMAT Team with the anticipation to add more in the near future. These members attend monthly trainings that range from hands-on scenarios to table top exercises to train for any HAZMAT situation that may occur.


Every member of the Oswego Fire Protection District is HAZMAT OPS certified through the OFSM. This certification gives every member of the department the ability to successfully start a HAZMAT incident while the MABAS 15 HAZMAT Team is activated and deployed with HAZMAT Technicians and equipment to mitigate the incident. For 2023, the members of Oswego Fire Protection District successfully completed a total of 834.75 hours of HAZMAT training collectively. FF/PM J. Petersohn



TECHNICAL RESCUE



The Oswego Fire Protection District Technical Rescue Team has seen some changes throughout the recent years, and 2023 was no different. TRT became members of the MABAS 15 team. This has secured our members positions on their training and deployable rosters. It also has provided us the opportunity to participate in their monthly trainings. Internally, the district made changes to our equipment we carry on our front-line fire apparatus. SWIFT WATER



The Water Rescue Team is in the process of establishing a Type A deployable Team, under the guidelines/standards of MABAS. Recently, meetings have taken place with Bristol Kendall Fire to begin establishing the framework and foundation of a MABAS Division 14 Type A deployable team. This process includes equipment recommendations, training requirements, certification levels, and developing a roster. Oswego Fire recently qualified as a Type B deployable resource through MABAS. Oswego Fire currently has over 40 members training to the level of Swift Water Technician. Members are continuously challenging themselves and are active in pursuing classes required such as; Swift Water Technician II, Flood Boat Operator, and Swift Water Boat Operator. – **B/C Dan Gallup**



INVESTIGATIONS





SRT MEDICS



SRT medics from the Oswego Fire Protection District participated in seven training days totaling over 56 training hours with the Kendall County SRT Team in the year 2023. Two new members were added after passing internal interviews, physical testing, and background checks. FIRE PREVENTION BUREAU



The Fire Marshal oversees the day-to-day operations of the Fire Prevention Bureau (FPB). This includes ensuring that the Fire District's codes and ordinances are up to date and relevant. Conducting occupancy inspections, new construction inspections, witnessing fire protection system acceptance tests and special inspections relating to code enforcement and fire protection system issues. The Fire Marshal reviews construction plans for fire and life safety code compliance and responds to FOIA requests about buildings and land. The Fire Marshal also assists with public information and community outreach through fire and life safety education presentations, press releases and social media updates. In the year 2023 the FPB completed the following:

- Conducted and participated in 100 Project Review Group meetings
- Completed 14 Kitchen Hood Suppression System Plan Reviews & Acceptance Tests
- Completed 104 Fire Alarm Plan Reviews
- Completed 83 Sprinkler Plan Reviews
- Completed 77 Fire Alarm Acceptance Tests
- Completed 78 Sprinkler System Hydrostatic Tests
- · Completed 627 Final Safety Inspections



BUREAU SUPPORT SERVICES



The Oswego Fire Protection District public education and community outreach programs have worked to reach, educate, and train the public on fire and life safety. Our members can be found at local community meetings, health fairs, and special events throughout the year. Our smoke / carbon monoxide detector program, car seat installation program, Knox Box program, CPR and AED programs are an effective means for establishing fire safety throughout the community. It also promotes an understanding and acceptance of regulations and technology that can improve safety within the homes, businesses, and institutions throughout the district. This year our support services completed the following:

- 50 car seat inspections and hosted a one day car seat event
- Annual blood drive with 24 donors
- OJPSA had 20 participants
- Our annual Open House had over 1000 attendees
- Attended several Career Fairs
- Attended multiple events as a member of the Kendall County Triad
- Toys for Tots collected 6,697 toys and 1,438 kids throughout Kendall County received toys



PROBATIONARY MEMBERS





Probationary members of the Oswego Fire Protection District are assigned a 12-month task book that must be completed during their first year of employment. In addition to the task book, daily evaluations are completed on each member. These evaluations cover fire and emergency medicine skillsets, teamwork, and station demeanor. After the completion of their probationary year, the candidate becomes a fully fledged firefighter/paramedic and is issued their official helmet shield and badge. 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NEW HIRES



In 2023 the Oswego Fire Protection hired seven new probationary Firefighter / paramedics.
